Now more than ever, students in Texas high schools are being encouraged to explore courses and content areas that they believe will challenge them and assist them with their preparation for post-secondary educational experiences. The new graduation requirements established by our state board have exponentially expanded student's ability to invest and participate in four years of instruction in a variety of content areas (ie: Athletics \& Fine Arts, Dual Fine Arts Programs, Language and Fine Arts, etc.), enabling them to graduate with a wide variety of Endorsements and Performance Distinctions (the new Distinguished Achievement Benchmarks).

Over the years, numerous studies have been conducted to determine and measure the benefits of music education. The results have repeatedly been an overwhelming testament to it's positive and long-term impact on the lives of young people, both personally and professionally.
Here are just a few examples of what researchers have found:

> "Music students out-perform non-music on achievement tests in reading and math. Skills such as reading, anticipating, memory, listening, forecasting, recall, and concentration are developed in musical performance, and these skills are valuable to students in math, reading, and science." > "College admissions officers continue to cite participation in music as an important factor in making admissions decisions. > "In a 1999 Columbia University study, students in the arts are found to be more cooperative with teachers and peers, more self-confident, and better able to express their ideas. These benefits exist across socioeconomic levels." The Arts Education Partnership, 1999.
